Library News

The Adrian School Library is participating in the third annual Reading is an Investment program being sponsored by Oregon State Treasurer, Randall Edwards. The program is designed to highlight the importance of reading, while teaching elementary children about the world of money and basic financial concepts. Students who complete the program will receive prizes and a certificates of achievement. They will also have a chance to receive one of 50 \$500 Oregon College Savings Plan scholarships to be awarded in April of 2009.

The Reading is an Investment program will be explained to Adrian students during their library classes and copies of the Recommended Reading List and reading logs will be sent home. To complete the program students must either listen to someone reading aloud for 400 minutes or read independently for 800 minutes. Three of the books read must be from the Recommended Reading List. (Reading lists available from the Adrian School Library show only the recommended books that are in our library; a longer list including books not available in this library can be found at www.ost.state.or.us/read.) Two of the recommended books (Beatrice's Goat and the Ulimate Kids' Money Book) were recently donated to our library by the State Treasurer.

Participant's names will be entered in the college savings plan scholarship drawing each time they read the required number of minutes—up to 10 times. The deadline for completing the reading requirements is March 13, 2009.

Please encourage elementary students you know to keep track of the time they spend reading so as to enter their names in the drawing for college scholarships.

Think back to one of your first days of high school: Waking up extra early to make sure your hair and makeup are perfect, finally getting to wear that new outfit that has been taunting you from your closet for the past three weeks, thinking you finally worked up the guts to ask that one person out, and the excitement of catching up with your friends. Unfortunately, my last first day of high school was nothing like this it was actually quite depressing. When the bell rang at 7:55a.m., the seniors reluctantly trudged to their first period class, knowing that eventually fifth period would come around - the dreaded Senior Project. Upon hearing the words Senior Project, a look of fear is reflected on many students' faces. Some would say that these words cannot even be found in Webster's dictionary and should be listed under the words "stress" or "procrastination". I can relate to this fear, as I too, was one of those students. After completing the first nine weeks of Senior Project, I have discovered that it's really not as stressful as students think; and to understand the concept of Senior Project, one must actually have first-hand experience and endure the challenge of this year-long, agonizing process, second only to giving birth.

This summer, while touring the world at Disneyworld's Epcot Park, where all your dreams come true, I was simply wishing that I could come up with a good Senior Project. A Senior Project about music and its positive effects came to mind, you know, the whole "nut doesn't fall far from the tree" mentality, but I realized that, as much as I love music, my cup of tea is writing and editing articles. When I was born, I was two weeks late from my expected due date - my mom still doesn't let that go - and I have finally figured out why: I had a list – a very long list – of all the grammatical errors I heard while in my mother's womb when she read aloud, and I had to fix all of them before I could possibly exit my pre-mortal existence and face our corrupted world, full of grammatical errors, typos, and misspelled words. I have decided that my physical project should be more original, helpful, and insightful. I will write and edit articles to be posted on our high school website and in the monthly newsletter from No-

Kat's Senior Project focused on journalism, specifically sports photography. Kat's physical project involved taking pictures of athletic activities that she was not involved in and creating the fall, winter, and spring sports slide show presentation for each sports awards banquet. She spent over 24 hours working on her physical project, even though the requirement was only four hours. Her research paper focused on the wage gap between genders in the workplace, with an emphasis on male versus female journalists.

Senior Project definitely had a positive affect on Kat. It helped her discover her love of sports photography. She is currently attending College of Idaho in Caldwell, Idaho and intends to major in either history or English with a minor in journalism. tographer for Sports Illustrated. She plans to become a journalist and attend various sports activities and take pictures for a living.


